

LESSON PLAN

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

The students will learn about

- different types of farmers
- the difference between manures and fertilisers
- irrigation of crops
- various agricultural practices
- change in food habits with time

TEACHING AIDS

A chart showing tools used in agriculture, blackboard, chalk, duster and digital content.

TEACHING STRATEGY

- When the students have done the Warm Up activity, ask them about the uses of tractor and plough.
- Tell the students the difference between big farmers, marginal farmers and tenant farmers.
- Explain the difference between manures and fertilisers.
- Tell about the methods of irrigation.
- Explain in detail the agricultural practices like ploughing, sowing of seeds, irrigation, weeding, etc.
- Ask the students the foods they like. Compare the food habits of today's generation with older generations.
- Sum up the chapter by going through points under the head 'Remember'.
- Finally, help the students do all the exercises.

BOOST UP

• Show pictures of tools used in agricultural practices.

EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES
