LESSON PLAN

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

- Learning about compassion to animals, being unselfish
- Reading, listening and understanding the lesson
- Answering questions orally and in writing
- Vocabulary—Words, meanings, spellings, pronunciation
- Grammar—Making sentences
- · Learning to converse

WARM UP

- Ask the students to give examples from their homes and observation about acts of kindness to—family members, neighbours, classmates, animals, etc.
- Discuss why it is necessary to be kind. What happens if we are selfish and unkind?
- Show the picture given in 'Warm Up' and ask the students to identify it. Tell about some anecdotes from the life of Gautam Buddha.

Outcome: What is kindness? Why should we be kind?

READ AND ENJOY

- Read the lesson aloud, students can take turns.
- Ask questions like, "What would you do if you find an injured bird or puppy?" "What do you do to help others and to be kind—at home, in class, in school?"

Outcome: Reading, listening attentively to words, pronunciation.

<u>READ AND UNDERSTAND</u>

- Let the students do Exercise A on their own. You can announce the correct answers and then the students can correct their answers.
- Discuss Exercises B and C. Answers can be given orally by the students. The teacher will write the answers on the blackboard. Students will transcribe them in their books.

Outcome: Understanding and answering the questions orally and in writing.

GRAMMAR IS FUN

- Explain with the use of blackboard, given examples and examples from class and home on how to form sentences.
- Discuss Exercise D. Do each question orally first and then ask the students to mark the correct answers in their books.

Outcome: Learning what a sentence is.

SPELL WELL

- Ask the students to identify the correct spellings.
- You can announce the correct answers after they have tried.

Outcome: Learning spellings, meanings and pronunciation.

WORD POWER

- The students often see birds around them and can easily identify the birds given in the pictures.
- You can announce the spellings of birds like kingfisher, penguin and vulture as they might be difficult for the students.

Outcome: Learning the names of common birds.

LET'S LISTEN

- Ask the students to listen to the passage carefully.
- Discuss the questions and their answers. Encourage students to answer the questions.

Outcome: Listening attentively, understanding and answering questions orally.

SPEAK WELL

- Read aloud the words of both columns one by one.
- \bullet Teach clear distinction between $|{\mbox{${\Lambda}$}}|$ and $|{\mbox{${\varpi}$}}|$ sounds.

Outcome: Differentiating between Λ and x sounds.

CONVERSE AND CONNECT

- Select two students as Raju and Gopal.
- Enact the conversation in the class.
- Correct their pronunciation, emphasis, pauses, etc.

Outcome: Learning to converse, speech, pause, emphasise.

SPEAK AND EXPRESS

• Let each student one by one speak on his/her favourite bird.

Outcome: Enhancement of self-confidence and speaking skills.

WRITE WELL

• Give hints to the students so that they can form sentences.

Outcome: Developing one's writing skills.

ACTIVITY/PROJECT

• The students will do this activity on their own.

Outcome: Expressing one's creativity.

LESSON PLAN

This poem is about a squirrel. It tells about its movements and its physical features.

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

- Enjoying the rhyme and rhythm of poetry
- Learning recitation with correct pronunciation and pauses
- Understanding the poem
- Answering questions on it

READ AND ENJOY

- Read out or recite the poem to the students.
- · Ask the students to learn it.
- Explain its meaning.

Outcome: Learning, recitation, meanings, spellings, pronunciation.

READ AND UNDERSTAND

- Let the students do Exercise A on their own.
- Discuss Exercise B. You can discuss about tails of some common animals like dog, cat, cow, etc.

Outcome: Understanding the poem and answering questions on it.

ACTIVITY/PROJECT

• The students will solve the maze on their own.

Outcome: Development of hand and eye coordination.
