SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

TEACHING AIDS

- Then, the teacher will ask the students to do the exercises given in the lesson.
- The teacher, then, will initiate a discussion on the topic given in Think and Answer.

- The teacher will initiate a discussion on the topic given in Let Us Do.
