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My Friends and Neighbours

LESSON PLAN

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

The students will learn about

- who friends are
- types of families in neighbourhood
- qualities of a good neighbour
- role of friends and neighbours

TEACHING AIDS

A chart paper containing activities of friends, different types of families, pictures of good neighbours, blackboard, chalk, duster, pointer, etc.

TEACHING STRATEGY

- ▶ First, the teacher will tell to students about the 'Warm Up' exercise.
- The teacher will describe qualities of friends.
- ▶ The teacher will compare and define big, small and joint families.
- ▶ The teacher will make the students understand qualities of good neighbours.

BOOST UP

- ▶ The teacher may advise students to name their friends.
- ▶ The teacher may ask students which type of family they belongs to.
- ▶ The teacher may show pictures of good families and neighbourhoods.
- ▶ The teacher may suggest students how to make a good family and a good neighbourhood.

EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES

The students are able to

- name their friends orally
- identify and count the number of their friends
- understand different types of families big, small and joint
- appreciate variation in family structure and discuss reasons for the same
- describe the neighbour's role and responsibilities in student's words
- appreciate and explain qualities of a good neighbour

EVALUATIVE QUESTIONS

The teacher may ask the following questions to evaluate the students.

- 1. Who is a friend?
- 2. How many friends do you have?
- 3. Which type of family do you live in?
- 4. List qualities of your neighbours.
- **5.** Why neighbours are helpful?
