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## **UNIT 2: MYSTERY**



## **SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES**

- Making the students understand the value of detectives in our society.
- Enjoying good detective and mystery stories. We all enjoy to play as detectives with good powers of observation and deduction.
- Making the students understand that skills and courage are needed by a detective to solve any mystery.
- With proper planning and keen observation, one can unravel any mystery.
- Comprehension: Learning to read and understand the lesson or any passage and answer questions on it, including reference to the context.
- Grammar: Sentences –kinds [Declarative, Interrogative, Exclamatory, Imperative]; Question tags; Transformation of sentences.
- ▶ Listening, understanding, reading, speaking, pronouncing and writing correctly
- Building a vocabulary, spellings, meaning, pronunciation for words synonyms, punctuation, dictionary skills, project work.
- ▶ Explain the layout of the lessons each Unit has 2 lessons, one is prose and one is poetry.

Get Going!	♦ Talk about (a) Good detective and mystery fiction: Agatha Christie, Arthur Conan Doyle, etc.
	♦ Exercise A: The teacher can read out the question and ask the students to respond; if they like the stories, they can explain why; if not, they can explain why not.
	♦ Exercise B: Nowadays, we have many sophisticated gadgets that help the detectives to solve cases. You can show the pictures of some gadgets to the students. Also, tell about their uses.
	♦ Exercise C: The students can do this question on their own.
Read and Enjoy	♦ Read aloud the lesson or ask the students to read it aloud. Explain it and discuss, asking small questions to assess the understanding of the class.
	♦ Ask questions like: Are we alert about people and events at home, in school, and in our neighbourhood?
	♦ Do we watch and observe who are the regular people and who are strangers? Do we recognise odd or suspicious behaviour?

<b>\$</b>	Use the board to brush up on nouns - their kinds: proper, common, abstract, material and collective.	Grammar Spot
<b>\$</b>	Use the board to explain how they are formed: use the given examples as well as your own, and ask the students to think of examples too from Adjectives and Verbs.	
<b></b>	Do Exercise A orally and then ask the students to write down the answers in their notebooks.	
	Explain the functions of a noun: as subject; as direct and indirect object and object of a prepositional phrase. A noun can also be used to show ownership – Henry's dog.	
<b></b>	Discuss Exercises B and C and then the students can do them in class.	
<b>*</b>	Brush up on Gender [masculine/feminine/common/neuter] and Number [singular/plural] using the board and your own examples.	
<b>\$</b>	Do Exercises D, E and F orally and then let the students write	
	them.	
<b></b>	Announce the answers aloud for Exercises A - F and let the partners check.	
<b></b>	Do exercise A orally first. Then the students can write the correct answers in their notebooks.	Word Wise
<b>\$</b>	Read the puzzles out and make sure that the students have understood what is required from them.	Listen and Learn
<b></b>	Then ask the students to answer them orally. Check the students where necessary.	
<b></b>	Exercise A: Read out and explain the exercise. Ask partners to discuss the subject given. Move around to guide and assess the discussions.	Converse and Connect
<b></b>	Ask the students to first collect information from the Internet. Then, they can make notes and speak about Agatha Christie.	Speak and Express
