

LESSON PLAN

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

- ▶ Learning about aliens—an introduction to some of the books, historical findings, references in mythology and to imagination such as seen in films like 'Koi Mil Gaya', 'X-files', etc.
- ▶ Stories and myths refer to superpowers—Superman, Spiderman, Batman, Hanuman, Marich, etc.
- Listening, reading aloud and understanding
- Expanding vocabulary, pronunciation, spellings and meanings
- Answering questions orally and in writing
- Grammar: Adverbs and their kinds; contractions; punctuation
- Understanding the universe and its mysteries. Introduce students to books by Carl Sagan, Erick Von Daniken, etc.

GEAR UP!

- Discuss the expanding universe; stories, myths and historical findings, etc. Elicit students' views and thus their interest will be aroused.
- Discuss the questions and let the students write the answers.

Outcome: Using one's imagination—visualise and think of the universe around us.

READ AND DISCOVER

- Ask the students to read aloud the lesson in rotation; check the correct pronunciation, pause, etc.
- Ask in-text questions regarding words and ideas in the lesson, e.g., having pets, riding a bicycle, getting lost, adventure, dog show, alien, etc.
- Ask in-text questions about the narrative, e.g., What is a carry basket? Shaggy was Robin's shadow—What does it mean? etc.
- Ask the students to read adventure stories of Enid Blyton and 'Harry Potter'.

ENJOY AND UNDERSTAND

- Exercise A: MCQs can be done by students on their own.
- Exercises B: Discuss in the class and then the students can answer on their own.

Outcome: Reading and listening attentively: Pronunciation, stress, pause, comprehending and answering the questions orally and in writing.

GRAMMAR SPOTLIGHT

- Explain about adverbs; different kind of adverbs—manner, time, place and frequency.
- ▶ Illustrate from daily life examples.
- Explain what contractions are using blackboard and examples. Do them orally also.
- Demonstrate punctuation on the blackboard in writing, and show how it is reflected in speech through pauses, inflexions, etc.
- Exercises may be done orally in the class. Add examples orally drawn from book or classroom.

Outcome: Learning about adverbs, contractions and punctuation: orally and in writing.

SPELL WELL

- ▶ The words with missing letter can be completed by each student on their own.
- Words, spellings, meaning and pronunciation.

Outcome: Learning words, their spellings and meanings.

VOCABULARY

- ▶ The exercise can be discussed orally in the class. Then, the students can do this on their own.
- Discuss phrases that have been done already and use more examples.

Outcome: Discussing phrases/word groups that mean something different from the words.

LISTEN AND LEARN

▶ Read out the passage and ask the students to listen to it carefully. After listening to the passage, the students will answer the questions orally.

Outcome: Listening attentively and answering the questions orally.

CONVERSE AND CONNECT

- Select two students to learn and enact the parts.
- The other students will correct pronunciation, expression, etc.

Outcome: Understanding speech correctly, pronunciation, stress, pause, etc.

WRITING

• Students can do the exercise on their own. Later, the teacher can announce the correct sequence of sentences in the class. Students can check and correct their work.
