

## Florence Nightingale

Poem

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Get Going!	<b>♦</b>	Exercise A: Make groups of four and ask them to make the
		collage as instructed. Display and share in class.
	<b>\$</b>	Exercise B: Ask each student to make a mask and bring it to
		class, and to wear it. Discuss its use.
Read and Enjoy	<b>\$</b>	Read aloud this beautiful poem or ask students to take turns
		reading it. It is a description of the work done by Florence
		Nightingale and of her kindness which earned her the love,
		respect and gratitude of soldiers. It is written in six stanzas,
		each with a rhyme scheme of aabccb.
	<b>\$</b>	In the first stanza, the poet describes the scene that gave
		Florence Nightingale the title of 'the Lady with the Lamp'.
		During the Crimean War, Florence attended the injured soldiers
		with loving care and efficiency. The walls of the camp where
		the wounded soldiers were housed were whitewashed, says
		the poet, a tribute to the sparkling cleanliness that Florence
		brought to the dirty, infection-ridden place. The poet describes
		the shadow of Florence on the walls as she walks along 'the
		darksome floors'. The light she carries falls on her face, with
		its 'soft, angelic smile'. Everything around her reflects the dark
		and tragic circumstances under which she works ['the dismal
		corridors'] and contrasts strongly with the care and light she
		brings into the place.
	<b>\$</b>	In the second stanza, the poet shows us Florence's kindness as
		she speaks softly and sweetly to the soldiers, who are grateful
		for it. They find her voice and words soothing, more 'than the
		most plaintive tale of the sad nightingale'. Also, this gentle
		lady bears both the name and the tenderness of a nightingale,
		because her name is Florence Nightingale.
	<b>\$</b>	As Florence walks through the rooms full of 'agony and
		gloom', the wards full of wounded soldiers and patients, the
		poet tells us that there are no irritated murmurs, no curses
		rising out of the pain from the people there. For everyone has
		only a prayer to offer as she appears to be an angel from God.
		She cries, feels deeply moved by the human pain around her.
		So nobody raises his voice in anger or agony even though they
		are in pain. Her presence brings them comfort.
		are in pain, their presence brings them connort.

<b>\( \rightarrow \)</b>	The gratitude that the patients feel, says the poet in the fourth stanza, is expressed by the way in which they lift themselves from their beds and look at her 'with eager, tearful eyes.' And some, who are unable to speak as they are dying, just bend to kiss her shadow as she passes by, grateful for that glimpse of her. They die in peace.	
	In the fifth stanza, the poet talks about the recognition of her work. She does not need a monument or statue for her true heroism, the risk she takes as she serves the sick, the injured and the dying. Each soldier who is lying there is a 'noble heart' who has served his country, and her name is engraved on their hearts. The recognition she will receive will follow for years, as every time her name is mentioned, the soldiers will have tears of gratitude flowing from their eyes.	
<b>*</b>	In the last stanza, the poet says that there are many today who have not seen the face of this saintly lady or the beautiful angel-like smile that used to flit across her face. But they will read her story and, in gratitude, kiss even the pages on which her story is written, a shadow of her presence, but so beautiful and noble.
