

Globes and Maps

LESSON PLAN

SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

The students will learn about the

- continents
- oceans
- shape of the Earth
- globes
- maps

TEACHING AIDS

Chart papers, a projector, models, flashcards, globes, maps, blackboard, chalk, duster, pointer, etc.

TEACHING STRATEGY

- Ask the students to answer the questions given in Warm Up. Initiate a discussion on the topic.
- Tell about the continents in detail.
- Tell about the oceans on the Earth in detail.
- Explain the shape of the Earth.
- Tell about globes.
- Tell about maps in detail.
- Tell about different types of maps. Explain the difference between political and physical map.
- Tell about the language of maps.

BOOST UP

- Explain the significance of legend or index.
- To make the lesson interesting, the teacher may show video clippings from Discovery and National Geography channels.
- The teacher may show a different types of maps.
- The teacher may show a globe.

- The teacher, then, will tell about the topic given in Knowledge Zone.
- The teacher will ask the students to solve the exercises given in the lesson.
- The teacher will initiate a discussion on the topic given in HOTS.

EVALUATIVE QUESTIONS

The teacher may ask the following questions to the students to evaluate them.
