Sir Charles Spencer Chaplin was popularly known as 'Charlie Chaplin'. He was a comic actor and filmmaker who became famous in the silent film era. Chaplin became a worldwide icon through his portrayal of 'The Tramp' which became one of the most important characters ever shown in films. His career was spread over a duration of 75 years. His childhood was spent amidst poverty and hardships. Charles Spencer Chaplin was born on 16 April 1889 to Hannah Chaplin and Charles Chaplin Sr in South London. Chaplin's parents were entertainers in the music hall tradition. His father worked as a popular singer whereas his mother had a brief career on stage. Charlie's parents were estranged in 1891. Since his father did not support them, Hannah found it difficult to raise her children as she also had no means of income except nursing and dressmaking sometimes. Chaplin was sent to a workhouse when he was only seven years old. He was reunited with his mother at the age of nine but was soon sent to another institution for destitute children. These experiences disturbed him a lot and left a mark on his mind that lasted for a lifetime. His mother was admitted to a mental asylum and father had become an alcoholic. She used to be a very cheerful person earlier but died a tragic death in 1928. His father also died at the age of 38, from liver cirrhosis. Chaplin had started working since he was five years old. He joined a theatre group and performed with them. His work was praised by all and he nurtured a dream of becoming an actor. 'Making a Living' was his debut film in 1914. Some of his other films were 'A Night Out', 'The Champion' and 'The Tramp'. He soon became very popular and was a household name. He appeared in 35 movies over the years and became a wealthy man. He also began to produce and direct movies. Though he acted in and made comedies, his movies carried a social message. Some of his famous movies were 'City Lights' and 'Modern Times'. He won many awards and was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II in March 1975. He was given a special Golden Lion at the Venice Film Festival in 1972 and a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 1970. He died in 1977.
